Reader: A reading from Philippians

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh, I have more: circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless.


Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but one that comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God based on faith. I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings by becoming like him in his death, if somehow I may attain the resurrection from the dead.

Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. Beloved, I do not consider that I have made it my own; but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on toward the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.

THE GOSPEL | John 12:1-8

All stand for the Gospel

Celebrant: The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John

People: Glory be to thee, Lord Christ.

Six days before the Passover Jesus came to Bethany, the home of Lazarus, whom he had raised from the dead. There they gave a dinner for him. Martha served, and Lazarus was one of those at the table with him. Mary took a pound of costly perfume made of pure nard, anointed Jesus' feet, and wiped them with her hair. The house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume. But Judas Iscariot, one of his disciples (the one who was about to betray him), said, "Why was this perfume not sold for three hundred denarii and the money given to the poor?" (He said this not because he cared about the poor, but because he was a thief; he kept the common purse and used to steal what was put into it.) Jesus said, "Leave her alone. She bought it so that she might keep it for the day of my burial. You always have the poor with you, but you do not always have me."

Celebrant: The Gospel of the Lord.

People: Praise be to thee, Lord Christ.



THE SERMON | Rebecca Warlow, Candidate for Ordination to the Diaconate

THE NICENE CREED |

All: We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshipped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come.


People: It is meet and right so to do.

Celebrant:

And here we offer and present unto thee, O Lord, ourselves, our souls and bodies, to be a reasonable, holy, and living sacrifice unto thee; humbly beseeching thee that we, and all others who shall be partakers of this Holy Communion, may worthily receive the most precious Body and Blood of thy Son Jesus Christ, be filled with thy grace and heavenly benediction, and made one body with him, that he may dwell in us, and we in him.

And although we are unworthy, through our manifold sins, to offer unto thee any sacrifice, yet we beseech thee to accept this our bounden duty and service, not weighing our merits, but pardoning our offenses, through Jesus Christ our Lord;

By whom, and with whom, in the unity of the Holy Ghost, all honor and glory be unto thee, O Father Almighty, world without end.



Mark your calendars: the deadline for ordering tickets is Saturday, April 19, for <u>a fundraiser</u> on Wednesday, April 30, that supports the <u>Baltimore International Seafarers' Center</u> (BISC), a program of the <u>Episcopal Diocese of Maryland</u>.

You are no doubt familiar with the seafarers' ministry through the annual collection of woolens, magazines, and calendars by the <u>Women of Christ Church</u>. The Center's outreach to mariners gained much wider attention after the tragic collapse of the Francis Scott Key Bridge, which was struck a year ago by a disabled container ship. The director of the center, the Rev. Joshua Messick, has continued to minister to 11 members of its crew, as described by the Baltimore Banner in a March 24, 2025, article, "<u>The Dali crew is still in Baltimore</u>, one year after the disaster."

Fewer Volunteers Will be Needed on Saturday, April 5 in Clarksville than in Past Food Drives at Local Giant Supermarkets

The highly anticipated Spring Food Drive will at last take place this weekend as we adapt to new rules that limit the number of volunteers on the supermarket premises. In response to a request by the management of Giant Foods, we must streamline the way in which Christ Church conducts its drive on Saturday, April 5, from noon to 4 p.m., at River Hill Giant, 6050 Daybreak Circle, Clarksville, Md., 21029.

A new corporate policy will limit us to four volunteers at any one time, and two of the four will be packing any collected groceries rather than interacting with Giant customers. Walk-in volunteers will be encouraged to do their part by taking a shopping list and purchasing some of the pantries' requested items. Groceries collected from shoppers will go to two food pantries. One is the Howard County Food Bank, which is operated by the <u>Community Action Council of Howard County</u> (CAC). The other is <u>SAFE</u>, its partner pantry that provides free gluten-free and allergy-safe foods to low-income families and individuals.

The need is great. The number of struggling households has grown in Howard County due to inflation and the mass firing of federal workers. In response, the CAC posted: "Terminated federal employees living in Howard County may visit the Howard County Food Bank to receive a bag of shelf staples twice a month for up to three months."
